Syllabus for Nematology Seminar (NEM 6931)

The objective of this course is to equip the student with skills necessary to present data in a professional setting.

- Attendance: Attendance is mandatory. Your class grade drops 10% for each unexcused absence. You must contact the instructor before seminar to request an excused absence. Make-up work will be provided for excused absences.
- **Grading:** <u>Engagement</u> is 10%. You should ask questions to at least 7 speakers over the course of the semester. You will also introduce one speaker and moderate questions for that seminar.

<u>Speaker Evaluations</u> are 30%. You will turn in an evaluation for each speaker by the following week and we will meet at the start of class to discuss evaluations.

Your <u>Abstract draft</u> is 5%. The abstract is due by the beginning of the class session two weeks before your seminar presentation. The instructor will provide feedback by the Wednesday before your final abstract is due.

Your <u>Abstract</u> is 15%. The abstract is due by the beginning of the class session one week before your seminar presentation.

Your <u>Seminar draft</u> is 5%. The draft is due by the beginning of the class session one week before your seminar presentation. The instructor will provide feedback by the Wednesday before your seminar.

Your <u>Seminar</u> is 35%. Seminars are based on the student's thesis/dissertation research thus far except through prior arrangement with the instructor. Online students will deliver their seminar via zoom from their UF REC or from Steinmetz 1027 in Gainesville.

Seminar grading rubric:

Mechanics (5 points): Was the speaker clear? Did they make eye contact? Did they use the pointer effectively? Were they within the specific time limit?

Figures and layout (10 points): Are wording, figures and tables large enough to read? Do figures effectively convey message?

Organization (10 points): Does the presentation have all needed sections (background, methods, objectives, etc.)? Is the information presented in a logical order? Is there enough background information for the audience to follow the presentation?

Science (10 points): Is all scientific information accurate? Is sufficient information provided to understand biology behind research? Are statistics displayed, if necessary?

Students registered for the inperson section of the class will meet in Steinmetz 1027. Online students will participate synchronously by Zoom (link to be provided). For the first two weeks we will have learning activities on how to prepare and deliver an outstanding oral presentation.

After seminars start in week 3, the class will meet from 12:50-1:35 to discuss our evaluations of the previous week's speaker and what we learned from their presentation. Seminars will be from 1:45-2:45.

All assignments must be submitted as email attachments. Seminar evaluations and Abstracts should be submitted in word or pdf. Presentation drafts should be submitted in powerpoint or pdf format. I will not accept hard copies. Your graded assignments will be returned to you in the same format. I have your gatorlink email addresses. If you use an email address different from your gatorlink as your primary email you need to provide it to me. It is your job to check your email regularly!
